About Rotary

What is Rotary?

Rotary is a worldwide organization of more than 1.2 million business, professional, and community leaders. Members of Rotary clubs, known as Rotarians, provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and help build goodwill and peace in the world. out the year as a way to get away from th pressures of school, work, family and just have a good time with each other.

There are over 32,000 Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas. Clubs are nonpolitical, nonreligious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds. The main objective of Rotary is service — in the community, in the workplace, and throughout the world. Rotarians develop community service projects that address many of today's most critical issues, such as children at risk, poverty and hunger, the environment, illiteracy, and violence. They also support programs for youth, educational opportunities and international exchanges for students, teachers, and other professionals, and vocational and career develop-

Although Rotary clubs develop autonomous service programs, all Rotarians worldwide are united in a campaign for the global eradication of polio. In the 1980s, Rotarians raised US\$240 million to immunize the children of the world; by 2005, Rotary's centenary year and the target date for the certification of a polio-free world, the Polio Plus program will have contributed US\$500 million to this cause. In addition, Rotary has provided an army of volunteers to promote and assist at national immunization days in polio-endemic countries around the world

by Rotary International, a worldwide association of serviceminded business and professional leaders. Today there are more than 7,500 Rotary-sponsored Rotaract Clubs in some 156 countries around the world, with over 173,000 members. "Rotaract" stands for "Rotary in Action". And although this action was created in 1968, it had many earlier predecessors such as the "20/30 Clubs" and the "Round Table Clubs".

What is Rotaract?

Rotaract is a Rotary-sponsored service club for young men and women ages 18 to 30. Rotaract clubs are part of a global effort to bring peace and international understanding to the world. The clubs are usually communitybased or university-based and are *continued on page 2* sponsored by a local Rotary club making them true "partners in service" and key members of the Rotary family. Through the Rotaract program, young adults not only augment their knowledge and skills, but they also address the physical and social needs of their communities while promoting international understanding the peace through a framework of friendship and service.

All Rotaract efforts begin at the local, grassroots level, with members addressing their communities' physical and social needs while promoting international understanding and peace through a framework of friendship and service.

Rotaract Club is a program under Rotary that focus on the 4 Avenues of Services: Community Service, International Services, Vocational Services & Club Service. It is one of the series of youth programs created by Rotary International, which focuses on the development of young adjust as leaders in their communities and workplaces by training and community service, locally and worldwide. All Rotaract efforts begin at the local, grassroots level, with members addressing their communities' physical and social needs while promoting international understanding and peace through a framework of friendship and service.

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Professional Development

A club's professional development activities should expand the members' understanding of the 2 work environment and business opportunities within their community. These activities should highlight the Rotaractor's role in the community's economic development and illustrate how skills developed through service activities can help in resolving problems in the workplace. Each Rotaract club should provide professional development opportunities to its members through activities such as:

- Professional and vocational forums
- Business technology updates
- Management and marketing seminars
- Conferences on business and professional ethics
- Presentations on finance and credit options for business start-up

Sponsoring Rotarians can enhance the professional development of Rotaractors by providing practical advice on entering the business world and tackling business, vocational, and professional challenges. Making the club's professional development projects into joint Rotaract-Rotary projects can also help Rotaractors get better acquainted with sponsoring Rotarians

Leadership Development

A club's leadership development activities aim not only to make members more effective leaders in their personal lives, but also to teach them how to develop and sustain strong clubs with relevant projects. Important topics to address in training club leaders include:

- Improving public speaking skills
 Building consensus among members
- Delegating project responsibilities and ensuring necessary follow-up
- Identifying channels for project publicity and promotion
- Finding financial resources for strengthening club development
- Assessing project success

Service Projects

Service Above Self is Rotary's foremost guiding principle. A

Rotaract club's service projects are designed to improve the quality of life at home and abroad. These projects often address today's most critical issues, such as violence, drug abuse, AIDS, hunger, the environment, and illiteracy. Each Rotaract club is required to complete at least two major service projects annually, one to serve the community and the other to promote international understanding. Each should involve all or most of the members of the club.

Goals of Rotaract are:

- 1. To develop professional and leadership skills
- 2. To emphasize respect for the rights of others, and to promote ethical standards and the dignity of all useful occupations
- 3. To provide opportunities for young people to address the needs and concerns of the community and our world
- 4. To provide opportunities for working in cooperation with sponsoring Rotary clubs
- 5. To motivate young people for eventual membership in Rotary.

American Cancer Society Relay for Life

Maui Food Bank Drive

Rotaractors teamed up with the Rotary Club of Kihei-Wailea and Rotaract Club of Chaminade to help raise \$1,281.27 and 2,727 pounds of food for Maui Food Bank

Dictionary Project

One of the goals of Rotary is to promote literacy. Rotaract Club of MCC joined Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Kiehi-Wailea to distributed hundreds of dictionaries to 3rd graders on Lanai and Molokai.

Pennies for Polio

Fall 206 marked Rotaract's first international service project called "Pennies for Polio." With the help of Ohana from Maui Community College, Maui's Rotarians, Queen Kaahumanu Center and Pukalani Superette, the Rotaract Club of MCC was able to raise over \$1,100 to purchase Polio vaccinations for children. With this money, Rotary will be able to save almost 2,000 children from this devastating epidemic

American Lung Association Asthma Day Camp

During summer of 2007, Rotaract club members (Tezrah, Chris, Kyla and Laycie) attended three (3) days camp from Friday to Sunday at Kamehameha School. The purpose of this camp was to educate children with asthma about their condition by providing different sports. Rotaract Club received a glass plate for helping out the activity.

Suitecase Drive for Foster Youth of Maui

Hundreds of foster youth on Maui are forced to carry their belongings from foster home to foster home in big garbage bags. Understanding the embarrassment that this can cause, Rotaractors teamed up with Keiki Kokua to collect suitcases, backpacks and duffle bags to these children. From January to February 2007, Rotaractors received overwhelming support from Maui Community College and collected over 100 suitcases, backpacks and fuffle bags with the Rotary Club of Kihei-Wailea contributing 44 of them.
